

A new thing



As I enter my sixth month of being the minister of Edinburgh Northwest Kirk, I am taking the opportunity to look back and reflect on our journey together so far. ENK is a busy place! Together we have passed the one-year anniversary (1 September) of the union of Cramond Kirk and The Old Kirk and Muirhouse (now known as Pennywell Kirk). We are one congregation with two sites hosting a variety of gatherings: worship services, Bible studies, coffee mornings, community group meetings, Scouting and Guiding groups, exercise classes, toddler groups, jumble sales, Christmas fairs... just to name a few.

It has been wonderful getting to know people through the newly formed Teams: Worship, Youth, Pastoral, Finance, Property, Social and Community, Communication and Technology, and Session Clerks. Members of the congregation give of their skills and time to help organise and implement the work of the church. As Christians, working in community, we remind one another that God continues to call us forward into deeper love, justice, and healing and we are to share this call with others. Sometimes this call is realised in the more structural governmental workings of the church, other times through engagement with others in our congregation, the wider parish and beyond.

Beyond teams and committees, ENK members engage in all manner of ways. We celebrate joyful occasions such as weddings, baptisms and blessings, and share the sacramental meal of Communion together. We grieve death and loss with one another at funerals, and continue to journey together during the harder seasons of life visiting one another in hospitals, hospices, and homes offering comfort and support. We work with and support local partner, national and global organisations helping to meet the needs of those struggling and suffering hardships caused by injustices.

We cry together, laugh together, ponder the hard questions together, pray together, and sit in silence together.

As we enter the season of Advent, we prepare ourselves for Christmas and celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ from long ago reminding us that although the darkness of this world seems overwhelming, God's light is ever present and guiding us today. We are Christ's hands, feet and heart in this world as we engage with one another, our parish, and the world.

May we continue to face the uncertain future with hope, faith and love, growing together in moral courage and spiritual clarity. As we become a new church together sharing God's healing love and justice with others, may we be encouraged by the voice of God speaking through the prophet Isaiah: "I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." (Isa 43:29)

I wonder, what new thing are you perceiving?

Candlemas

Long ago the Christmas season lasted for 40 days from Christmas Day until 2nd February - Candlemas. In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child – to 'present Him to the Lord'. At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Why Candlemas? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day.

What is R2?



North Edinburgh Response and Recovery Group (R2)

North Edinburgh Response and Recovery Group (R2) is an umbrella organisation for community groups to find out what each is doing and how they can support each other. They believe the networking among activists and workers in the community is the best thing about the meetings. Over 30 groups are involved including Pennywell Kirk, Project Esperanza, Spartans, Pilton Equalities Project, Citizens' Advice, Muirhouse Housing Association, Drylaw Neighbourhood Centre and The Pitt. Never heard of The Pitt? It's based at 20 West Shore Road and includes an indoor and street food market as well as a large space for all kinds of events.

R2's working groups include:

- a Food Working Group which is considering buying food together to reduce cost and waste,
- an Active Travel Working Group looking at proposals for Pennywell Road and involving people who run the bike repair service,
- a Community Spaces Working Group (including representation from Pennywell Kirk) which matches needs with available halls/rooms. R2 members are strong supporters of Pennywell Kirk remaining. It needs work done to it but it is seen as the right building in the right place and
- an Anti-Racism Working Group which is producing a toolkit against racism.

R2 believes it is important to be present at the City of Edinburgh Council's planning meetings.

Recent good news includes:

- the 2025 North Edinburgh Community Festival will take place on 17th May and
- the Macmillan Hub off Pennywell Road has opened, including Muirhouse Library, a nursery for 150 children and, by the time you read this, North Edinburgh Arts should be open.

Where did the name

Suddenly everyone's calling it Pennywell Kirk. But isn't the church in question called Edinburgh Northwest Kirk: The Old Kirk and Muirhouse Church? Yes and no. It's an awful mouthful as a few people were honest enough to say. When someone suggested the name Pennywell Kirk, it was tried out unofficially to see if it worked better. It seems that people were relieved to have a shorter name. In former times The Old Kirk served the people of West Pilton and St Andrew's Muirhouse served Muirhouse. Pennywell Road has West Pilton on one side and Muirhouse on the other. The church is on Pennywell Gardens, so all in all the name seemed to fit. And it caught on. Presbytery has agreed to change the name of the church to Edinburgh Northwest Kirk: Cramond and Pennywell so now it's official!

Scran Academy is an Edinburgh charity which uses food and cooking to help young people, regardless of background or barrier, fulfil their potential in learning, work and life. Too many young people in our most challenging communities never realise their talents or aspirations due to the effects of social inequality and poverty. One in four young people in Edinburgh has their future limited by poverty and many youths, for various reasons, find it difficult or impossible to engage in education and work. Scran Academy exists to change all that. Our work involves education and enterprise to allow young people pathways to a positive future, increasing their confidence, selfesteem and employability and not just in the catering industry. Using new-found cooking skills the youths gain responsibility and work experience in the Scran Van mobile catering service - anything from wee parties to big weddings and from individuals to church congregations. We also sell goods including our famous Christmas hampers which are designed, made and packaged by young people who, as a result, gain a Nat4 Enterprise qualification.



Rangers and Guides go to Essex International Jamboree



Friends old and new

After a year's planning and fund raising the Essex International Jamboree was all it said it was and more. Excitement rose as the girls travelled by train through London and on to Chelmsford: 10 guides and rangers from Cramond and three rangers from Stockbridge.

We joined over 4,500 scouts and guides from more than 30 countries including New Zealand, Australia, United States, Taiwan, China and Canada. Overall, 8,000 people in a temporary village set up specifically for the weeklong jamboree. We set up our campsite and prepared to challenge ourselves, meet new people, make new friends and have fun. The weather was glorious, so warm in fact that we treated ourselves to a paddling pool to keep everyone's feet cool.

Over five days we took part in a different activity each morning and afternoon. There were themed evenings where everyone took part and live entertainment on the main stage.

Comments from the girls included:

- 'I had such an amazing week in Essex. The Cramond rangers were so welcoming and friendly and it was great to get to know them. I loved trying out so many new activities and emptying the waste water every 5 minutes.' – Liv, Stockbridge Ranger
- 'I really enjoyed trying out using crossbow and the rifle shooting. I loved the live music that was on the main stage.' – Georgina
- 'What I liked about EIJ was meeting new people and making new friends. The activities were always so fun especially Enterprise where we had to make sweets, market and promote them, all with a view to having a successful business. My number one favourite thing was the paddling pool. It was very hot.' - Elsie
- 'I loved doing new activities like climbing, abseiling and Segways. My favourite activity was probably "It's a knockout" (like the 1970s TV programme) because we got to take part in so many different games and challenges and meet new people.' - Siriol
- 'I enjoyed challenging my comfort zone and trying new experiences, whilst also having a great time.' Orlaith
- 'I loved the rifle shooting and axe throwing. The music on the main stage and in the "house of music" was so fun and I loved making new friends.' Gemma

Keeping cool



Kids Love Clothes is a volunteer-led charity based in Ratho which provides pre-loved clothes for children from newborn to aged 13. Working via referrals from health professionals and social workers, volunteers choose a whole wardrobe's worth of clothes for each child referred. The clothes are ironed, folded and packaged into beautiful giftbags, ready for delivery back to the referring professional. Giftbags are free and the recipients receive quality clothes that have been put together with care and attention. Anything not used by Kids Love Clothes is passed on to other charitable organisations so nothing is wasted.

St Columba's Hospice Visit

Some of you volunteer at St Columba's Hospice and may also have visited friends there but in September I was shown round for the first time by Maggie Young, who runs the Hospice's Compassionate Neighbours service. The hospice is there for people suffering from cancer, neurological and other life-limiting conditions.

What a wonderful place! I was bowled over by the beautiful courtyard with fountain, the views over the Firth of Forth, the stunning artworks throughout the buildings and the excellent coffee shop.

Maggie co-ordinates 60 volunteers who offer friendship and companionship to people with a life-limiting condition. For the last 18 months this has included Compassionate Gardeners, where volunteers help Hospice clients with gardening. It's believed to be the only service of its kind

run by a hospice in the UK. The service runs from February to November. Maggie is looking for more green-fingered volunteers – if this appeals to you please contact Maggie. compassionateneighbours@stcolumbashospice.org.uk

I was amazed by the range of services offered by the Hospice. Lisa Kerr, who runs the Hospice's Wellbeing Service, gave me a tour of the complementary therapy rooms. There is a wide range of in-person and virtual wellbeing groups including "a wee brew and a blether", hairdressing and podiatry. The complete list is available via this QR code or email wellbeing@ stcolumbashospice.org.uk. There are 20 volunteer drivers if people need transport to

these free sessions. The whole emphasis of the Wellbeing Service is to provide the right

service at the right time.

Thanks to the vision of Dr Derek Doyle of Corstorphine who started the hospice in 1977, the generosity of those who give of their time and money and the superb staff, St Columba's Hospice is a welcoming, caring, hopeful and serene place.



Joram Haruna and his family worship at Pennywell Kirk. In June 2023, aged 17, Joram was diagnosed with Hodgkin lymphoma. After six rounds of chemotherapy his cancer is now in remission. Keen to help other children with cancer he is featured on a Cancer Research UK poster in a campaign to raise awareness of children's and young people's cancers. He and his family also held a coffee morning in aid of Cancer Research UK in Pennywell Kirk in October.

Joran's advice to other teenage cancer sufferers is: "accept the support you can get, because keeping these feelings and emotions bottled up can only lead to more panic, more anxiety and more worry. I realised I did need that help, and that family and friends were there for me, to give me support." His Mum, Macrine, paid tribute not only to the medical specialists who cared for Joram but also to those who helped her family including other families affected by childhood cancer and mentioned Calum's Cabin which provides respite holidays on Bute and near-hospital accommodation in Glasgow.



Joram had to defer his university place for a year but is now studying chemical engineering at Edinburgh University. We wish him well in his studies.

Perfect Novel for Cramond Lovers

Something of a well kept secret, you probably haven't heard of "The Turning Tide", a murder mystery novel set in Cramond village. Written by Catriona McPherson and published in 2019, it's not well known locally, possibly down to limited circulation. The story follows a particular assignment for aristocratic sleuth Dandy Gilver who is brought to Cramond to investigate the Cramond ferrywoman's claims that she murdered Peter Haslett, a young man found dead in the mouth of the river Almond. It's a fascinating read for anyone that knows the area. The main characters find digs in Cramond House (home these days to Little Monkeys Nursery). They are brought to the village by the Minister from the Kirk. They have many enlightening conversations in our beloved Cramond Inn and the 'Turning Tide' pub (which is where the Royal Oak used to be, on the level below The Maltings). As the plot develops, the author beautifully describes action and adventure in well-kent locations such as Cramond Island, Cobble Cottage, Cramond Brig and wider Edinburgh. Much of the suspense in the book revolves around the proprietors of the four local mills: Cockle, Fair-a-Far, Peggy's and Dowie's. The book is highly recommended for those who like an old fashioned murder mystery, particularly those with an interest in Cramond. But be aware, if you walk around the village or up the river walkway whilst you're reading the novel, you might find yourself muddling up the fiction with the reality!
